Yes: JMK had told me about the
£200 p.a. (for 5 years) Wittgenstein fund
for the augmentation of W.E. Johnson's stipend.
And I seem to remember sometime when
I was looking for something else in the
official C.U. Reporter, finding a notice in 1913
augmenting the salary of the Sidgwick
lectureship, with a footnote saying that
the money was provided by an anonymous
benefactor. So I'm pretty certain it was
in fact.

When I return to Cambridge next week
I will research in the Reporter & send you
my results. It may be feasible for the
published accounts to know how long the

definitely was found. [If the University
was so sorry then as it is now, it
would not have accepted the offer without
having the £1000 paid over to start
with.]

There would be no easy way of
finding out whether W.E.J. reduced his
professional supervision work. [And of course
the 1914 was reduced it anyhow]. I
am pretty sure he had no official teaching
position in Kings or in any other College^x
so he would have received no regular
salary (other than his Fellowship dividend)
but would have been paid for at piece-work
rates by the College for which he did
supervision.
