I have heard from Munby, who looks after that part of the Keynes papers that are in King's College, that he can say "with a fair degree of confidence" that there are no letters from Wittgenstein. This accords with my memory. The more massive collection of economic papers went to the Marshall Library, but I should hardly think that they would be among these. Geoffrey Keynes also took away some private letters to retain for the time being in his own possession. These were mainly letters of an intimate character, which he did not wish seen by others just yet. I was in the house (46, Gordon Square) when he took his stuff, and I am pretty sure that it did not include Wittgenstein.

Meanwhile I have written to Mrs Adrian about the memorial to Pinsant, and have not yet had a reply. Your letter to me suggests that you think this "paper" was some kind of essay; to me it looks from the wording rather more as if it were a notice of some sort.

I was walking near here in a village called Sunningwell and saw Pinsant's name in the parish church on the Roll of Honour for 1914-18.

I will let you know what I hear from Mrs Adrian.
