Professor F.A. von Hayek, the economist now at Chicago, is engaged in writing a memoir of the late Ludwig Wittgenstein. I believe that your brother was a friend of the latter in the old days before the First World War. Hayek came across various references to him and enquired of me about it. He has now written to me again enclosing copies of Keynes's letters, which I send herewith. I should be grateful for it back. Hayek writes: "Can you tell me anything about the paper about a memorial to Pinsant mentioned in the typescript. I suppose it is a paper by K.?" The wording of this seems to suggest a misapprehension on Hayek's part. I would have supposed that the "paper" was merely information or a request for support, while Hayek seems to imply that it was some kind of an essay by Keynes. Can you throw any light on this? I am so sorry to bother you with it.

By a coincidence, a few days ago I walked into the parish church at Sunningwell. There I saw a memorial to those who had died in the First World War, including - am I right? - your brother. I did not realise your family had lived in these parts.
